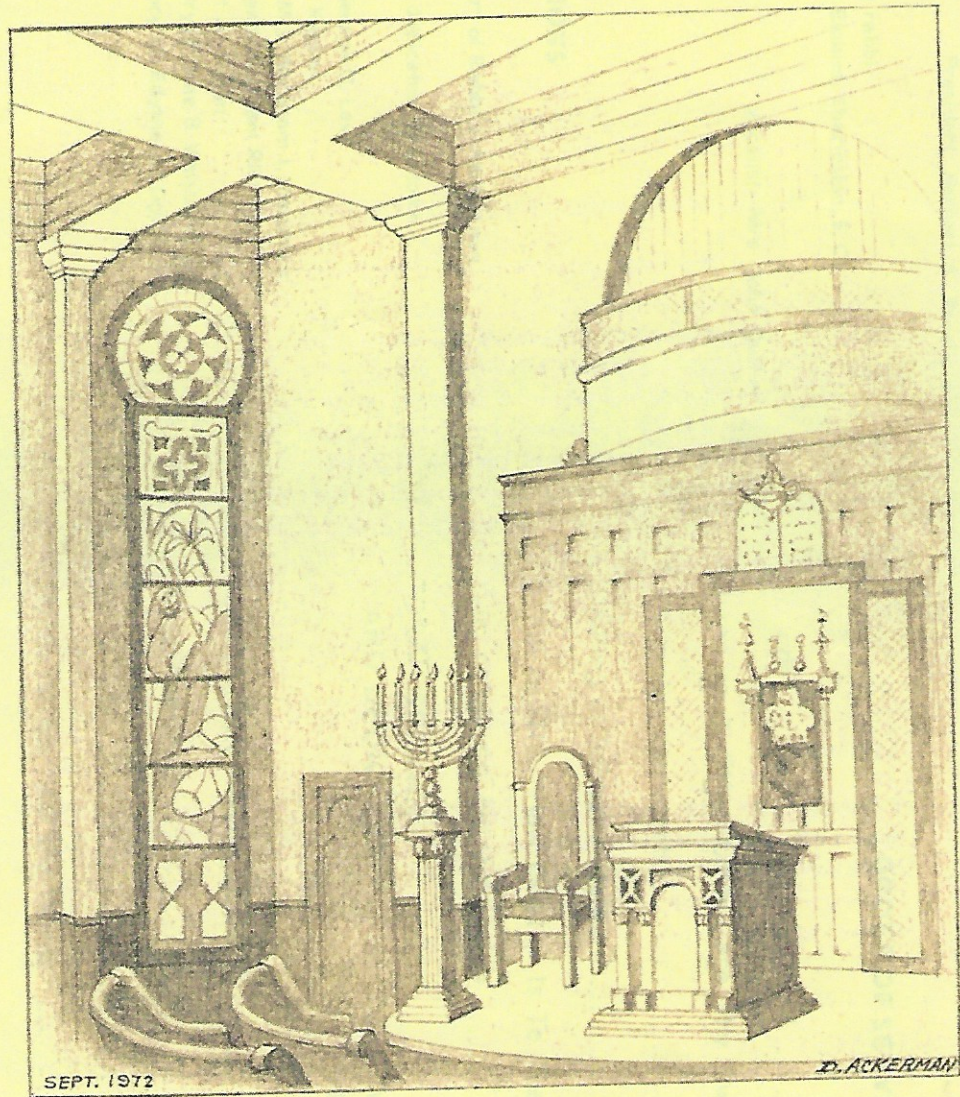

TORAH DEDICATION SERVICE
Friday Evening
January 12, 1972--8:00 P. M.

This service, except for the CIRCUITS (see below), will be a regular Friday Night service using Servic no. II, UPB.

Hymns:
Opening: No. 2.
Intermediate (following the lighting of candles, when announced);
No. 110.
Closing: No. 63.

The CIRCUITS (we better rehearse this part very thoroughly in advance):

During the Torah service the "L'cha Adonay", as an exception, will not automatically follow the "Sh'ma". Instead this is what will take place:

As we finish singing the "Sh'ma", Mr Denmark and Mr Moses will bring the new Torah from the Annex into the sanctuary. Rabbi Cohn and myself will go down to meet it carrying the old Torah with us. We all go back up to the platform.

I push the red light. We all start making the first circuit of the sanctuary, and you accompany us with singing Hal'luhu (see attached photocopy). You should start singing as soon after I signal with the red light as possible; try to time the singing so it lasts us the entire circuit; and do not not start singing again until the next signal. This circuit ends when all of us mount the platform.

Procedure for the second and third is the same, using the same song each time.

At the end of the third circuit Rabbi Cohn and myself return the old Torah to the Ark; the red light will signal the fourth time, and now you sing "L'cha Adonay" as the new Torah is undressed and placed on the podium.

At this point the dedication speeches will be made Torah read. When we come to the return of the scroll, we are back in the standard service. There will be no sermon at this point, so don't shut off the organ after "Aytz Chaim", because we go straight into the Adoration.

Rabbi Cohn will give the Benediction, and I don't know which one he will use. Please consult him just before the service. As a minimum we'll need one nice big and healthy on at the very end.
